JOSEPH BILBY TO RECEIVE JANE G. CLAYTON AWARD

Joseph G. Bilby has been chosen to receive the 2011 Jane G. Clayton Award, to be presented at Archives and History Day at the Monmouth County Library Headquarters, Manalapan, on October 15. Created in 1997, the Clayton Award honors an individual who, over a substantial number of years, has made exceptional contributions to an awareness, understanding, and/or preservation of the history of Monmouth County, New Jersey. It is named after the former County Clerk who was responsible for the creation of the Monmouth County Archives.

Joe Bilby received his BA and MA degrees in history from Seton Hall University. A Vietnam veteran, he has taught military history on the community college level and lectured widely on Civil War and New Jersey history. He is currently part-time Assistant Curator of the New Jersey National Guard and Militia Museum in Sea Girt, New Jersey and a free lance writer and historical consultant. He is the author, editor or co-author of twelve books and more than 300 articles on New Jersey history and folklore, military history and outdoor subjects. His Monmouth-related books include *Monmouth Court House: The Battle That Made the American Army*, *Asbury Park: A Brief History*; and *Sea Girt: A Brief History*, and his several books on New Jersey's Civil War regiments such as *Remember You Are Jerseymen: A Military History of New Jersey's Troops in the Civil War* co-authored by William C. Goble includes information about Monmouth soldiers.

Mr. Bilby has appeared on the History Channel's Civil War Journal, the Discovery Channel's Discovery Magazine, and RTE, the Irish National television network, as an expert on the Civil War and 19th century firearms. He is a Trustee of the NJ Civil War Heritage Association, a member and publications editor of New Jersey's official Civil War Sesquicentennial Committee, and content editor of the Committee's website. Historic Preservation Education Thrives at Drew University!

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Macculloch Hall Historical Museum Acquires Nast Original

This summer Macculloch Hall Historical Museum shares a recently acquired original pen and ink drawing by the famous nineteenth-century political cartoonist Thomas Nast. This seasonally topical piece, *Where Shall We Go This Summer?*, was drawn by Nast in 1882. It was featured on the cover of *Harper's Bazar*, whose title was interestingly spelled with only one "a" in this period, on June 10 of that year.

The museum already owns the engraved image from the periodical. The two versions now hang side by side on the second floor landing of Macculloch Hall. The images are almost identical; there are only minor differences between the two pictures which will be on display during touring hours Wednesday, Thursday and Sunday between 1 pm and 4 pm until Sunday, October 30th.



In commemoration of the 150th Anniversary of the Civil War, pay tribute to the war's hundreds of soldiers and sailors with a visit to their gravesites at the historic Rahway Cemetery and the Evergreen Cemetery in Hillside, including those of the many Blacks who fought in regiments of the United States Colored Troops (USCT).

This year's tour options are:

#1 Janet Evanovich's Burg – Guide, Jim Carlucci - Stephanie Plum, “a bounty hunter with attitude,” debuted in *One for the Money* in 1994. Author Janet Evanovich, who set her mystery series in the Chambersburg section of Trenton, created a fictional landscape of crime and wacky characters. Visualize Stephanie's world before the Hollywood version, visit a bail bondsman, a funeral home where Grandma Mazur attends wakes, and a number of Steph's favorite haunts.

#2 Coming to Trenton – Guide, John Hatch - As a 19th century boom town, Trenton attracted waves of immigrants to work in its factories. The factories aren't in production any more, but the immigrants have never stopped coming. Visit traditional food vendors, churches, work places and special collections. See what first-generation immigrants brought to Trenton, what's been saved and how their influence has changed how we live.

#3 Seldom Seen Spaces – Guide, Sally Lane - This could be called the private tour ~ it's an invitation to visit places that aren't open to the public. Most are in private hands but the few in the public domain have agreed to show us what isn't on show for everyone else. Be advised that stairs are the norm on this tour ~ that's how you get to a tower or a garret. We'll also be checking out quirky spaces at lower elevations.

#4 Two-hour Sightseeing Trip – Guide, Joe Teti - Sit back and enjoy seeing neighborhoods, historic sites from early 18th century and the Revolutionary War onward, retrofitted industrial areas, and many highlights of a city that's been the state capital since 1790. While you see the sights old and new, you'll hear about famous residents, visitors and a scalawag or two. Morning and afternoon tours available.

Historic circa 1812-1820 Essex County Militia Banner to be Restored NJ Historical Commission Awards Grant to the Historical Society of West Caldwell

The New Jersey Historical Commission, a division of the Department of State, has awarded a grant of \$3,000 to the Historical Society of West Caldwell. The money will go towards the restoration and preservation of a painted militia flag believed to have been flown by members of a Caldwell Township, Essex County Cavalry Militia unit between 1812-1820.

During this time period the name “Caldwell” referred to old Caldwell Township, which today includes the towns of Cedar Grove, Verona, Roseland, Essex Fells, Livingston, Fairfield, North Caldwell, Caldwell, and West Caldwell, making this flag a historical artifact of interest to the residents of all these towns. Once the flag is restored, the society plans to provide opportunities for the people of Essex County to view it and learn about it in the context of the War of 1812 during the upcoming bicentennial of the War of 1812.

The flag is approximately 30” high by 42” wide and is painted on each side. On one side is a profile of a uniformed man wearing a shako helmet and carrying a sword; he is mounted on a rearing horse. Above him is a red ribbon that reads “2__ REG: ESSEX [S]QU[A]DRON” in gilded letters. The other side shows the seal of New Jersey: two women flanking a central shield of blue, with the figure on the left holding a red flag; the figure on the right holding a cluster of large flowers and a shield with three images of a plow, painted in white. A horse’s head in profile rests above the shield. A red ribbon below the shield reads “CALDWELL TROOP” in gilded letters.

Former Caldwell Historian E. Lesley Byrnes received the flag from the late Raymond Francisco Dey (1905-1995), who donated it to the society in the 1990s. Dey believed that the flag was associated with Gen. William Gould (1757-1847), who served in the Revolution, the 1794 Whiskey Rebellion in Pennsylvania and the War of 1812. Joseph G. Bilby, historian and assistant curator at the National Guard Militia Museum of NJ, Sea Girt, states that the uniform and type of headgear indicate that the flag probably dates to the period 1814-1820. Bilby also notes that the term “Squadron” referred to a cavalry unit.

New Jersey’s involvement in the War of 1812 continued until the end of the war in 1815. Although the records are sparse, the available data indicate that there were at least two dozen Essex County militia companies activated for this conflict. Two of them are described as Caldwell companies. One was part of the First Regiment, an infantry company lead by Captain Isaac Crane, while the other was part of the Third Regiment, a rifle company lead by Captain Simeon Crane. A third company, called the Columbian Volunteers, was organized in Caldwell in 1814 and led by Captain Rufus Harrison. It is not yet known if this unit served in the War of 1812. Research on the topic is ongoing.

The Historical Society of West Caldwell (HSWC) would like to hear from other groups that have military records or artifacts from this period, especially records of militia units, particularly those of Essex County. If you know of plans to commemorate the bicentennial of the War of 1812, please contact the HSWC at PO Box 1701, West Caldwell, NJ 07007-11701 or hswcaldwell@gmail.com. The HSWC is a not-for-profit corporation whose purpose is to bring together those people interested in history, especially that of West Caldwell and vicinity; and to acquire and encourage the preservation of documents, pictures, other artifacts, buildings, and sites of historical significance. The society is seeking additional funding for the creation of an exhibit for the flag.



HISTORIC COMMISSION APPROVED IN CALDWELL, By Diane Lilli

For years, Caldwell Mayor Ann Dassing has vowed to create an historic preservation commission for the borough. In May, her wish became a reality as the Caldwell council voted to approve the formation of this new commission.

"It's been a long time coming," said Dassing. "I think it will set Caldwell apart from other towns in the area." More importantly, she added, this new commission "will provide us with grant dollars, and we'll have a wonderful inventory of all our restored structures in the town. I am looking forward to this, as it is also a great source of ideas for us in the future."

The borough is noted for a famous historical birthplace—that of former U.S. President Grover Cleveland—and now has an historic preservation commission to back up the historical significance of other buildings. The council voted unanimously to pass this ordinance.

The new ordinance to create an official Caldwell Historical Preservation Commission was discussed at the council meeting. Members of the public spoke, with David Cowell in favor of this new organization. Cowell is the official historian of Caldwell.

"I'm in favor of this resolution, with one or two small changes to matters regarding sections of ID or designation of historic structures," said Cowell. "Major changes require consent of the owner of the property. The language seems to suggest owners should consent, which is fine, but it doesn't specify what happens if the owner does not consent. Also, a 'landmark' indicates district as well as property, so if one person in the whole district objected, we would have a major problem." Cowell said the language should be amended, and that the intentions should be clearer. "If we amend that language a little more carefully we might achieve the goals and purposes of this legislation," he noted.

Borough attorney Greg Mascera thanked Cowell for the efforts he made in assisting and drafting the ordinance.


RAILROADS AND NEW JERSEY: A BIBLIOGRAPHY OF CONTEMPORARY PUBLICATIONS, 1812-1901

The late Donald Arleigh Sinclair compiled the bibliography over several decades. It has been enlarged, edited, and indexed by David J. Fowler. The reference work has more than 2600 entries which focus on contemporary books, pamphlets, broadsides, and annual reports. No other work on the topic contains the amount, the variety, and the detail of primary source material related to railroads in the state during the 19th century.

A comprehensive index accesses the massive amounts of information in the bibliography. In addition to proper names, including the names of scores of railroad companies, subjects such as accidents, employees, equipment, guidebooks, lawsuits, maps, monopoly, resorts, taxation, and women are indexed. An appendix arranges all the entry numbers chronologically.


UNION COUNTY'S BLACK SOLDIERS AND SAILORS OF THE CIVIL WAR

In keeping with the many activities and books written in commemoration of the 150th anniversary of the Civil War, Ethel M. Washington recently released her new book, *Union County's Black Soldiers and Sailors of the Civil War*, published by the History Press of Charleston, South Carolina.

The illustrated book focuses on the contributions of the many soldiers and sailors of African ancestry who served in the U.S. Navy, regiments of the United States Colored Troops, and/or white regiments organized in and out of state, a little known and mostly overlooked history fact. In addition to its 70 photos, the book includes the names, military records and some personal information about individual veterans.

Ms. Washington also authored *Union County Black Americans*, published in 2004 by Arcadia. She contributed five entries on Black history to the *Encyclopedia of New Jersey*, edited by Maxine N. Laurie and Marc Mappen, 2004. She received her B.S. from Central State University of Ohio, M.A. and M.Ed. degrees from Columbia University. Ms. Washington is the History Programs Coordinator at the Union County Office of Cultural and Heritage Affairs.

Directions to the First Presbyterian Church of Sussex

From Route 80/Route 15

Take Route 80 W to Exit 34B –Route 15 N towards Jefferson and Sparta.

Stay on Route 15 N for about 10 miles.

Take the exit ramp for Route 517 toward Sparta and Franklin.

At the traffic light at the end of the ramp turn right onto Route 517.

Stay on Route 517 for 5 miles. At the traffic light, turn left onto Route 23 N.

Follow Route 23 N for about 8 miles. When you get into the town of Sussex you will come to a traffic light where Route 23 and Route 284 meet. (there is a Baptist Church on the right at the corner). Go straight (Do NOT turn left to follow Route 23) through this light and make the very first right onto Harrison Street. (This road is right after a white house and right before and old stone building).

Follow Harrison Street until the end. You will come to a stop sign by St. Monica's Church. At the stop sign, turn left onto Unionville Ave. The parking lot for the First Presbyterian Church of Sussex is about 50 feet down the road on the right. Additional parking is also available across the street.

From Route 23

When you get into the town of Sussex you will come to a traffic light where Route 23 and Route 284 meet. (there is a Baptist Church on the right at the corner). Go straight (Do NOT turn left to follow Route 23) through this light and make the very first right onto Harrison Street. (This road is right after a white house and right before and old stone building).

Follow Harrison Street until the end. You will come to a stop sign by St. Monica's Church. At the stop sign, turn left onto Unionville Ave. The parking lot for the First Presbyterian Church of Sussex is about 50 feet down the road on the right. Additional parking is also available across the street.

From Route 206

Take Route 206 N through Newton to Ross's Corner, the intersection of Route 206, Route 15, and Route 565. There is an Exxon station on the left and a Park and Ride on the right. At this light continue straight onto Route 565. Follow Route 565 for 7.2 miles.

At the first traffic light, continue straight onto County Route 639.

Stay on Route 639 for 1.4 miles. At the first traffic light, turn left onto Mill Street in Sussex Borough.

At the blinking light (0.1 miles down Mill Street) turn right onto Newton Ave.


At the stop sign, go straight across, going up the hill on the right side of the Fountain Square Inn.

When you get to the top of the hill, the First Presbyterian Church of Sussex will be on your left. Drive past the church and the parsonage. There will be a parking lot of the church on your left. Additional parking is also available across the street.
